China in Transition, 1945-1955

University of Bristol 8-9 October 2011

Programme

The period from 1945-1955 was one of the most dramatic, creative and disruptive in China's modern history. This period saw the end of the Sino-Japanese War (1937-1945), the collapse of the *Guomindang*, and the establishment of the People's Republic of China. Yet this period has received relatively little scholarly attention. It is only recently that researchers have gained access to previously closed Chinese archives, and have been able to move beyond the dominant narratives and political biases of the Cold War. This makes the 1945-1955 period a particularly rich area for new research. This workshop considers the changes and continuities in China from 1945 to 1955. How did China's ideas and institutions (broadly defined) transition during this period? What kinds of local, national, and international transformations took place, and what remained the same? What happened to China's place in the world during these years? This two-day workshop will bring together postgraduate students, early career scholars and senior scholars working on a range of topics within the humanities and social sciences. We hope that the workshop will foster dialogue and an opportunity to collaborate with one another and with senior faculty members.

Travel Information

Directions to Bristol

If you are arriving from Bristol Airport, please take the Airport Flyer into town (the Clifton Triangle stop is the most convenient for the university). If you are arriving from any of the major London airports, we recommend that you first make your way into central London by bus or by train. The Heathrow Express train directly links Heathrow Airport to Paddington station and is a convenient option if you are unfamiliar with London (however tickets can be expensive at around £18, so a National Express bus may be a cheaper option).

Trains to Bristol leave from Paddington station and take around 1hr 40mins. We recommend you purchase tickets in advance if possible, as they are usually cheaper (see www.nationalrail.co.uk). When travelling to Bristol, please make sure that you book your train ticket to **Bristol Temple Meads** station (not Bristol Parkway). From Bristol Temple Meads station you can either get a taxi directly to the conference location, or take the number 9 bus and get off at Woodland Road/the University (please ask the driver to tell you where to get off - they are usually very friendly).
